SPRING PLANTING FOR NON-PROFIT COOKING

SALT LAKE CITY, UT - Volunteers are busily tilling the soil at a donated piece of land between 600 and 700 East on 100 South. They're doing it for the no-menu, no prices non-profit restaurant called One World Everybody Eats.

Lawrence (Bo) Dean, a sous chef for One World helped collect the names of interested Salt Lakers over the last few weeks. As people come to the unique eatery for its organic soups, salads and entrees, they saw the request for help to get the land ready for producing herbs and spices. About a dozen people are planned to be at the location, on a Sunday.

One World Everybody Eats began in 2003 as One World Cafe. Owner Denise Cerreta was inspired to go to a non-profit format in 2005, and the establishment received its status in December 2006. Ms. Cerreta started One World Cafe with the belief that people are basically honest and don't want to be forced to overeat, or waste food and money. The goal of the organization is to establish other community kitchens in other cities around the country. It has received national attention for its concept and has spotlighted the uniqueness of the generosity and willingness of Salt Lakers to support humanitarian endeavors.

The non-profit organizes several volunteer planting and harvesting events throughout the year, not only for it's own garden but in support of organic farmers throughout the valley.
