



No prices, no menu restaurant receives non-profit status from the I.R.S.

SALT LAKE CITY, UT - One World Cafe, the no menu, no prices eatery that has been making a difference in Salt Lake City for more than three years has received tax-exempt, non-profit status from the Internal Revenue Service.

The entity, which is the brainchild of founder and Ohio native Denise Cerreta, was started as a for-profit cafe in 2003 on the belief that people are basically honest and don't want to overeat, eat unhealthy food, or eat prohibitively expensive food. "The intent was to always eventually become non-profit," says Cerreta, "since I thought we could do so much more." The cafe, now called a "community kitchen," is part of the non-profit, One World Everybody Eats. It was featured last week's in Time Magazine's online edition.

The community kitchen currently plays an integral role in community building in Salt Lake by paying workers a living wage, feeding anyone regardless of their ability to pay, and working with and supporting local organic farmers. The Salt Lake community kitchen also provides a volunteer program to help anyone with a desire to obtain certifiable, food-service training, and take that experience with them for careers in the food service industry.

With the acquiring of non-profit status, One World Everybody Eats can now begin accepting donations of cash, equipment, property and other items from individuals and philanthropic organizations to begin placing community kitchens in other cities. On the list of first cities where One World Everybody Eats will establish the kitchens are New York, Washington D.C., Iowa City, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Chicago, Boston and Atlanta.

"We're about a hand up, not a hand out," says Ms. Cerreta. "And we're still here."
